- 2) Evaluations

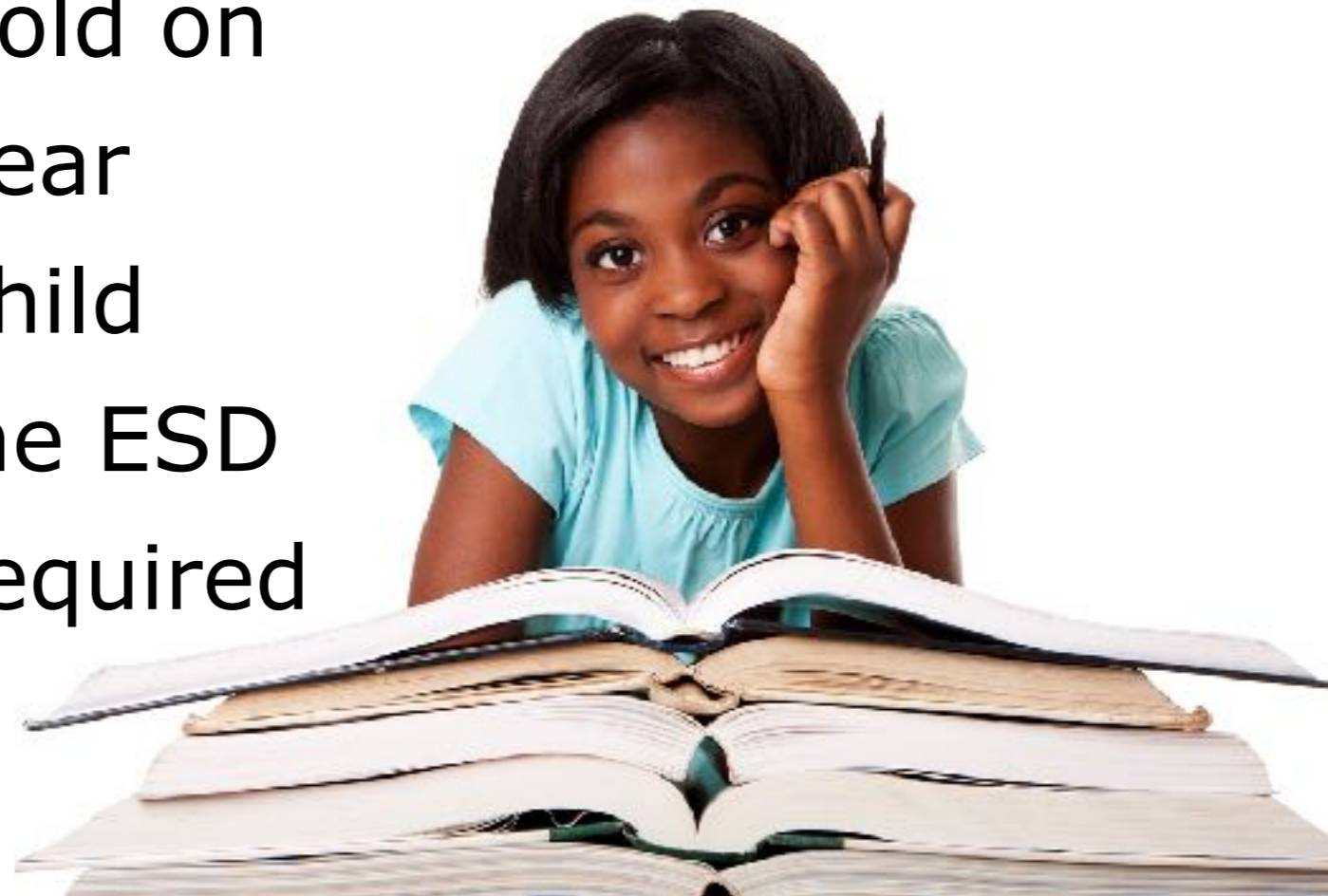


Oregon Homeschooling Laws & Requirements

Notification

- Send in a notification of your intent to homeschool
- When child is 6 years old on Sept 1 of the school year
- Notify only once per child
- Paper letter goes to the ESD
- Include only what is required

Oregon Homeschooling Laws & Requirements

Evaluations / Testing

- End of grades 3, 5, 8, and 10
- By qualified tester
- Keep your test results on file in case ESD requests it
- Test at/above 15th percentile
- Lower scores enter a 2-year remediation process

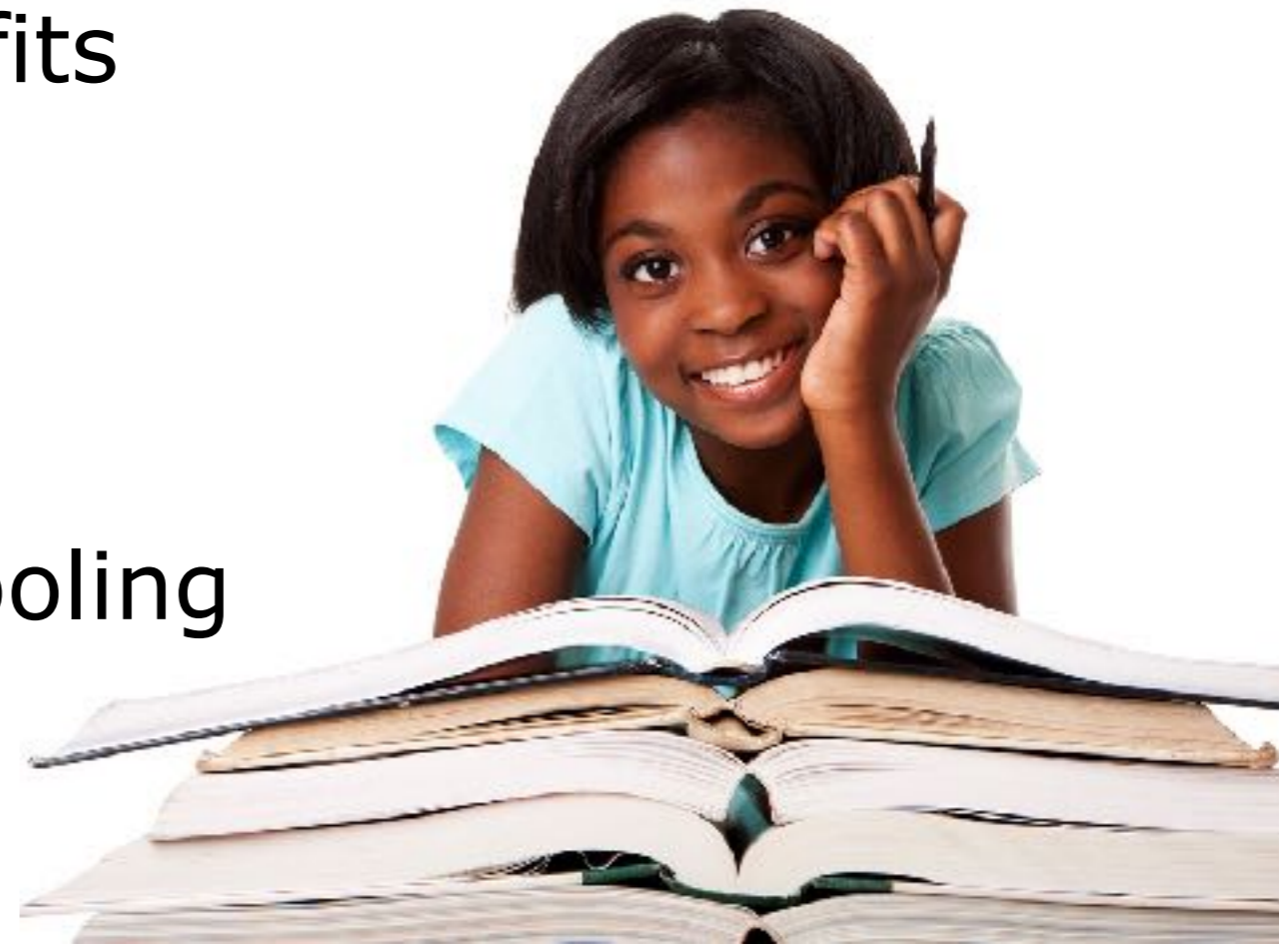

Special Needs

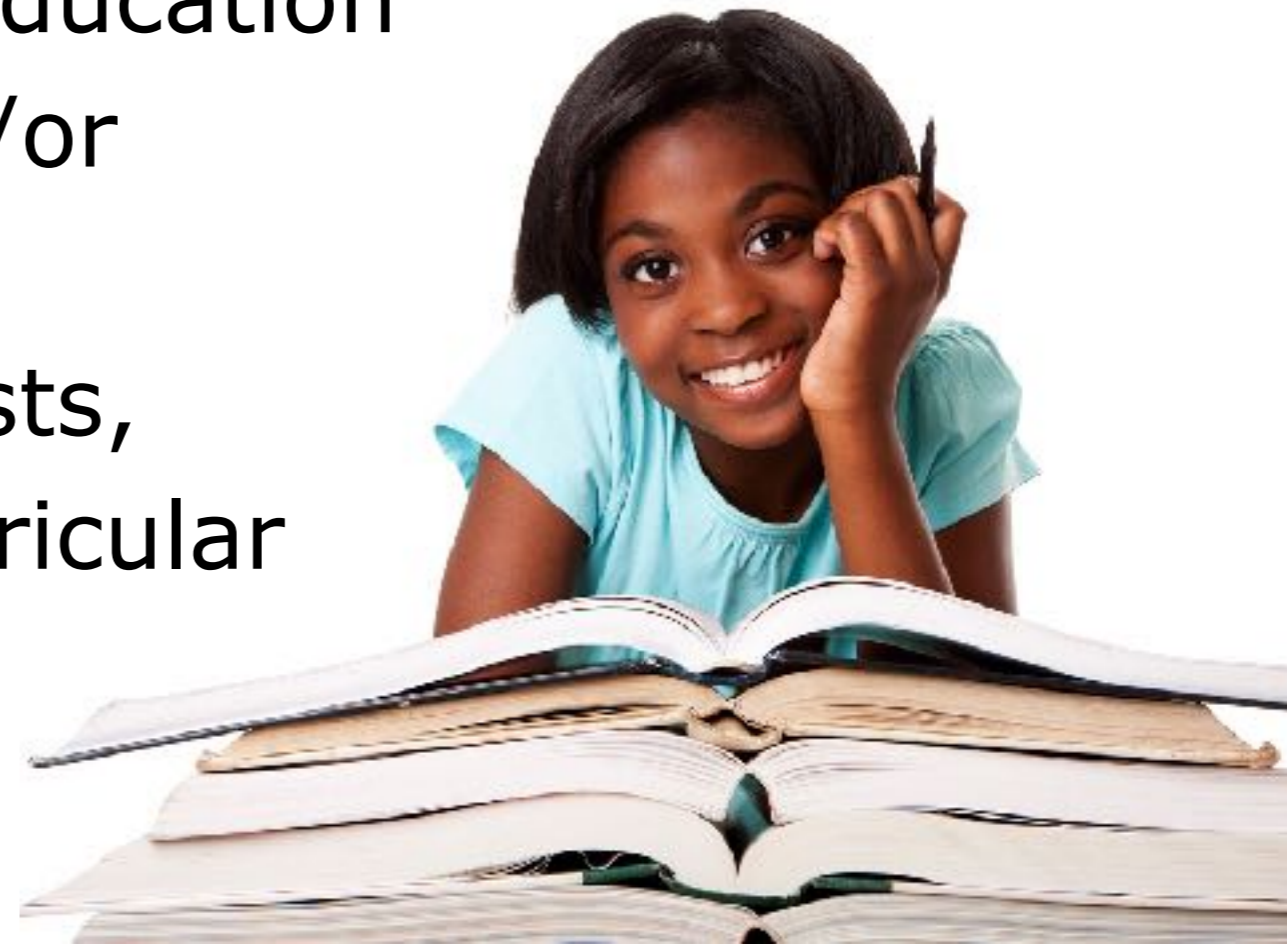
- Alternative evaluation options for special needs students (IEP or PDP)
- A PDP is the most flexible option for evaluations
- Craft an education that fits their needs
- Recommend an HSLDA membership
- Special needs homeschooling resources on web site and in membership



Oregon Homeschooling Laws & Requirements

High School

- Parents issue transcript & diploma
- No requirements for graduation
- Aim for a well-rounded education prepared for college and/or trade school path
- Time for pursuing interests, volunteer work, extracurricular activities



Oregon Homeschooling Laws & Requirements

What's NOT Required

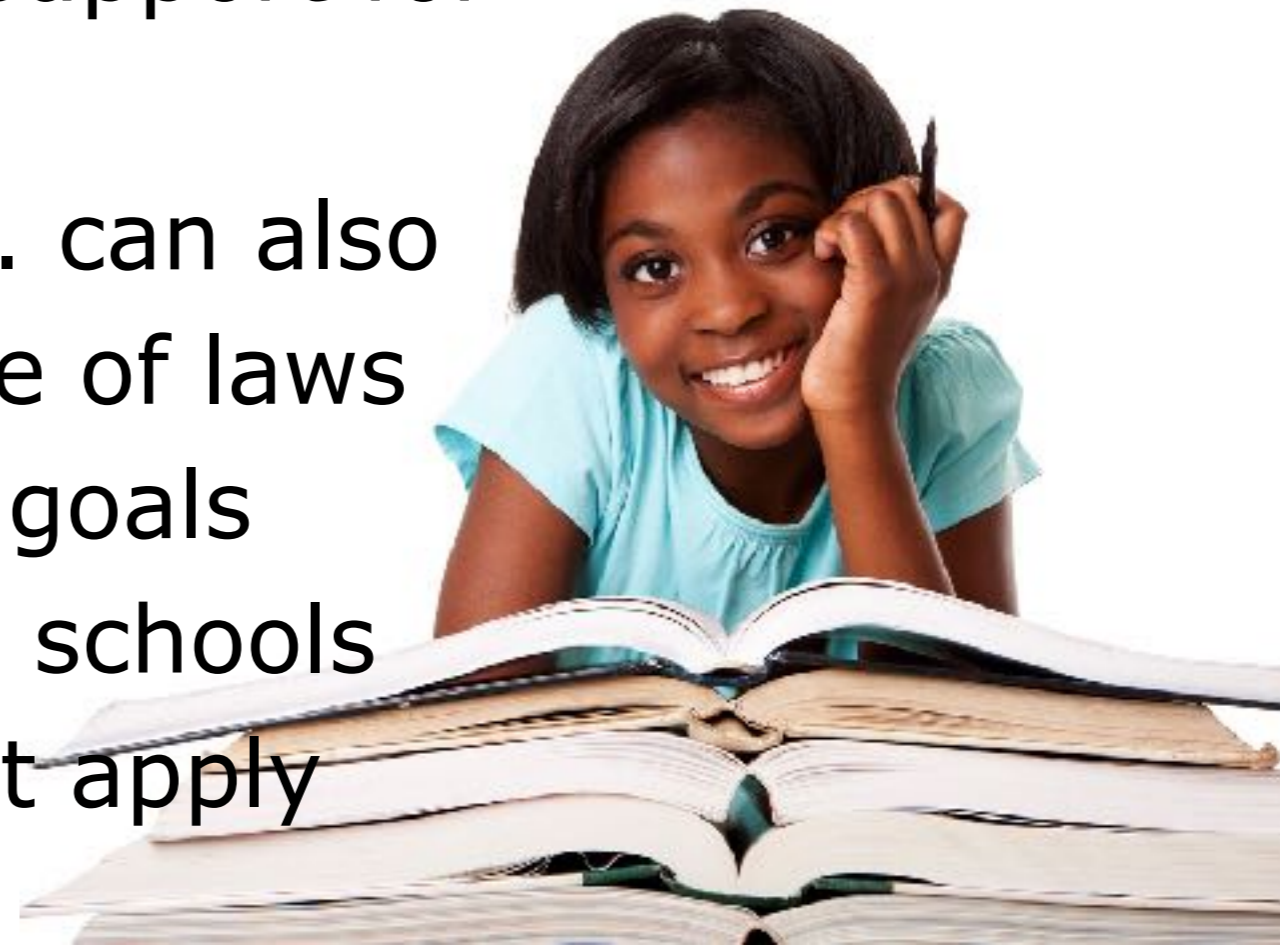
- Portfolios, annual testing, etc.
- Assigning grades or grade levels
- Participation in a co-op, etc.
- Accredited curriculum / school
- 180 days of homeschooling
- Minimum daily schooling hours
- Certain subjects
- What public school is doing
- What your friend is doing



Oregon Homeschooling Laws & Requirements

What About Charter Schools, Microschools, Hybrids, etc.

- Co-ops and support groups are great ways to get accountability and support for parent-led homeschooling
- Microschools, hybrids, etc. can also be an option, but be aware of laws and whether they fit your goals
- Charter schools are public schools so homeschool law doesn't apply

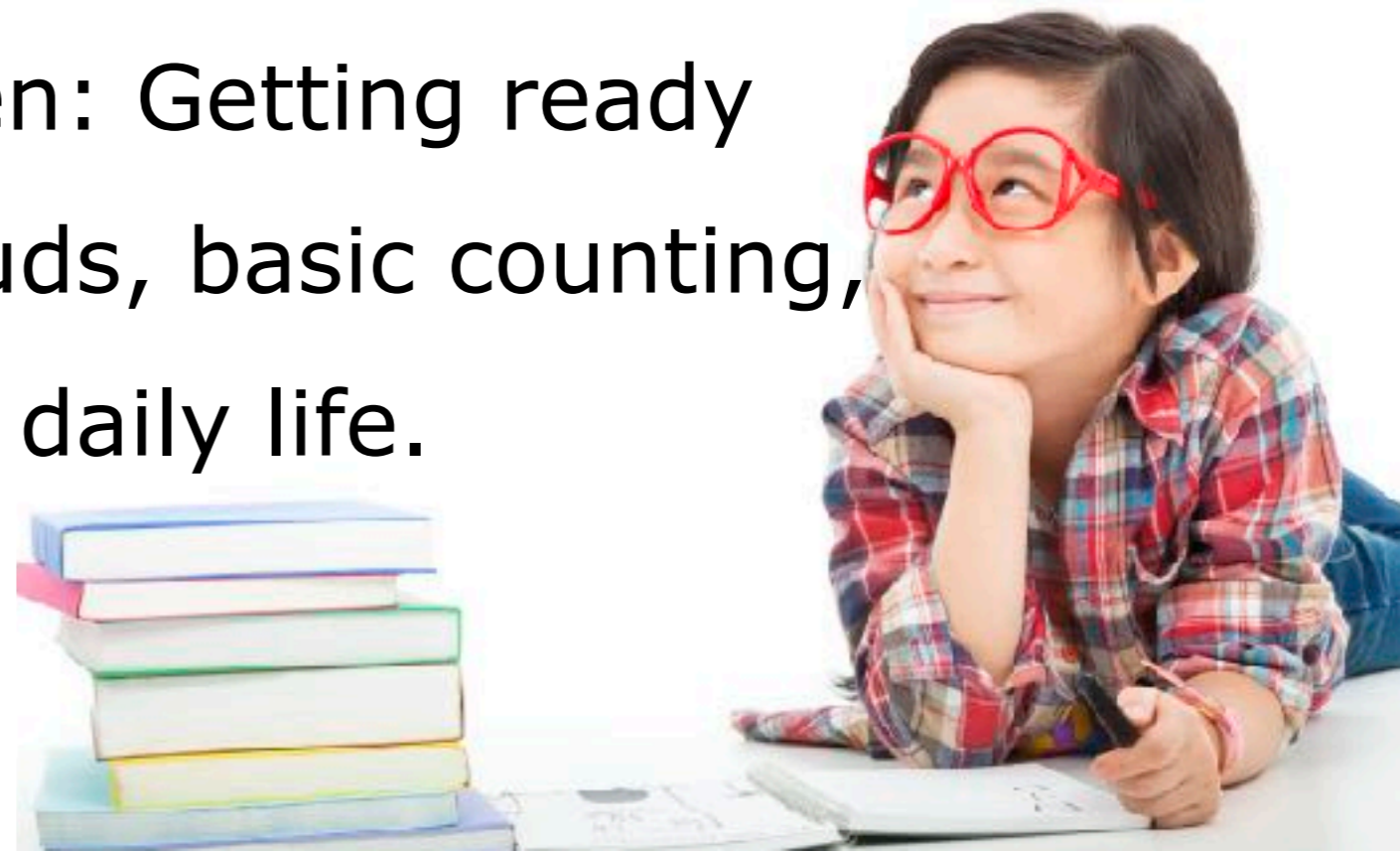

Get Ready to Start Homeschooling

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 - No legal requirements imposed upon parents about what to teach and when to teach it.
 - Preschool - Kindergarten: Getting ready to learn. Play, read alouds, basic counting, learning experiences in daily life.

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- 4th - 8th Grade: Add on other subjects (science, history, and geography, etc.) & delight-directed learning.



Get Ready to Start Homeschooling

 - In middle school grades, work on initiative/diligence & independent learning habits, & focus on weak areas to prepare for high school

Four Kinds of Education

	Publicly funded	Privately funded
Brick and Mortar	 <p>Public School: Publicly funded brick-and-mortar schools. The majority of students in the U.S. attend public school. The state funds the schools, provides the teachers and sets the course of study.</p>	 <p>Private School: Parents fund their school and pay for it. Education takes place in a classroom, most often in brick-and-mortar buildings. Most schools are church-based schools.</p>
Home based	 <p>Public School at Home: The state pays for the school, but the education takes place in the home. This can be online education and other schools which use state-funded dollars of the state rather than the presence of a teacher, etc.</p>	 <p>Private Homeschool: Parents pay for their children's education, except the course of study, provide the materials, and do the teaching or pay for a qualified tutor.</p>

Private Homeschooling is not the same as Public School at Home. Even though both take place in the home, they have different funding and control. Students in the Public School at Home program are still considered public school students and their funding comes from the dollars of the state. Homeschool students are not public school students, and are not funded by the dollars of the state.

Private Homeschooling is effective. Based on 188 letters from the national homeschool movement, a recent study and data collected by state Departments of Education have consistently shown that home educated students score an average 20 percent higher than their brick-and-mortar counterparts.

Advantages of Private Homeschooling

- Tutor-style education helps each child achieve his or her full educational potential.
- Flexibility to go at their child's pace in various areas of subjects.
- Time to explore new interests and develop unique talents.
- Parents work with their children and are able to help them when they are stuck or need extra help.
- High school students can get as much as 100% of their college education at a lower price.

Notification

- Notify the Educational Service District (ESD) of your intent to homeschool.
- Notification needs to be sent for each child when they turn 6 by September of that school year.
 - If you are withdrawing from public school, notify the ESD of your intent to homeschool within 10 days of beginning your homeschool.
 - There is a "Letter of Intent to Homeschool" example in this binder.
 - Only provide the required information in your letter:
 - Your name and address.
 - Name and birthdate of child.
 - Name of the last public school your child attended or the school of which you reside.
 - For a child with a disability/special needs, you also need to include the child has a disability.
 - We recommend sending a paper letter in lieu of using the online notification registration forms ESDs provide.
 - ESDs are required to send an acknowledgment of receipt of your notification within 90 days.

Evaluation

- Complete evaluations at the end of grades 3, 5, 8, and 10 by August.
- If you recently withdrew from public or private school, wait 18 months before doing the required standardized testing.
 - Evaluations must be completed by a qualified tester who is not related to the student. (For more details on qualifications and a list from the OCEANetwork, go to <https://www.oceanetwork.org/homeschool-laws-nc-special-needs>.)
 - Keep test results on hand in the event your ESD requests them. (Some ESDs never do, some make a blanket request in their acknowledgment of your letter of intent.)

- If your student scores below the 15th percentile on their standardized test, they must test again the following year. The score for the second test must be the same or better than the previous year or they will enter a remediation process. Interscholastic Activities

By law (ORS 333.960), homeschool students in Oregon are allowed to participate in public school interscholastic activities. Such activities include but are not limited to "athletics, music, speech, and other related activities."

- To participate, homeschool students have additional testing requirements.
- They must complete standardized testing every year by June 15.
- They must score at or above the 23rd percentile based on national norms.
- The results must be submitted to the school district before participating in the activity.

Homeschooling Students with Special Needs

Oregon homeschool laws make provisions for home educating children with eligible disabilities and allows alternatives to standardized testing.

- Submit a letter of intent as described above.
- Evaluations must be completed at the end of grades 3, 5, 8, and 10.
- Evaluation options:
 - Complete standardized testing just as with a non-special needs child.
 - Work with the school district on an IEP (services are provided at the school district's discretion).
 - Create a Privately Developed Plan (PDP) which was developed in Oregon as a low-cost alternative that gives parents the most flexibility and control.
 - IEP and PDP options require an official diagnosis.

What's NOT Required

- Portfolios or other work samples
- Attendance, # of hours a day, # of days a week
- Certain courses, subjects, etc.
- Certain graduation requirements

What about Charter Schools?

Charter schools are technically public schools, and so the above homeschool laws and requirements do not apply. You'd need to talk with the charter schools to see what is required. Be sure that when you are discussing requirements, testing, notification, etc. with others that you are both discussing the same type of schooling option. Otherwise there is sure to be confusion.

OCEANetwork support parents' rights to choose the method that best fits their family. However, there are several reasons why we focus on and recommend independent homeschooling over other educational models.
