Testimonies in the signers' own words:

Samuel Adams - "I rely on the merits of Jesus Christ for a pardon for all my sins."

Charles Carroll – "On the mercy of my Redeemer I rely for salvation and on His merits; not on the works I have done in obedience to His precepts."

John Witherspoon – "I entreat you in the most earnest manner to believe in Jesus Christ, for there is salvation in no other."

Robert Treat Paine – "I am constrained to express my adoration of . . . the Author of my existence, in full belief of . . . His forgiving mercy revealed to the world through Jesus Christ, through whom I hope for never ending happiness in a future state."

Benjamin Rush – "My only hope of salvation is in the infinite, transcendent love of God manifested to the world by the death of His son upon the Cross. Nothing but his blood will wash away my sins."
